#### The Presidents' Letter

February was a very busy month for the ECHL. We held a continuing education class for electrical contractor license renewal on February 8<sup>th</sup> at the IBEW. I would like to thank Business Manager Ed Devine for making a room available since we were not able to hold the class at the Elks Lodge. There were 18 people in attendance. We had four excellent speakers discussing website design, availability of electrical materials, insurance coverage, and artificial intelligence. It was the best contractor class in recent memory.

At the general membership meeting on February 10<sup>th</sup>, there was an election of officers for 2025. The list of nominees was in the February Wire. No other nominees were presented at the meeting.

After the election, there were updates given on House Bill 29 and House Bill 54. These reports generated a lot of good discussion on matters impacting the electrical industry by outside organizations.

Following these reports, Metro Inspector Norb Thorpe and myself discussed the sections of the 2023 National Electrical Code that are being delayed from enforcement. This discussion led to many questions and comments from the members. I would like to thank Norb for stepping in cold to help facilitate the presentation. Because it went over so well, we will probably continue this presentation for the March 10<sup>th</sup> meeting.

We had 42 members present. Congratulations to David Witten for winning \$50 from the 50/50 drawing.

Beginning July 15, 2024 any license renewals for contractor, master, or electrician licenses will be for two years. With this next renewal, you will pay a fee for two years. When you renew again two years later, you will be required to have 12 hours of continuing education for each license that is being renewed and will pay a fee for two years. Hook up delays

Louisville Gas & Electric Company is committed to giving the customer the best experience possible in providing service to their project. One of the problems that continually hinder our ability to connect underground services in a timely manner is obstructions preventing access to the pad mount transformer and/or splice box. The crews often arrive to discover debris such as dirt, rocks or discarded building material piled up blocking the area needed to connect the service. When you know service is about to be connected, make sure the area is clear and free of any hazards. We will not move any of the objects. Also make sure there is no silt fencing in the way as well. Our crew will not be able to return the same day to connect the service. This means a several day delay in returning.

#### Code Corner

Article 240 Overcurrent Protection Submitted by Dennis Steier

Article 240 has several new sections that you need to be aware of that could affect whether you are following the 2033 *NEC*. These changes were elsewhere in the *CODE* and CMP-10 thought that it should apply to all services as well.

The first new section is **240.11 Selective Coordination**. I have written an article about this before in *The Wire*, it was required in **Article 517 Health Care Facilities**, Selective Coordination is where you coordinate your overcurrent protective device so a downstream device would short out and does not trip any upstream devices. 240.11 states, *If, one or more feeder's overcurrent protective devices are required to be selectively coordinated with a service overcurrent protective device by other requirements in this Code, all feeder overcurrent protective devices supplied directly by the service overcurrent device shall be selectively coordinated with the service overcurrent protective device.* 

The other new section that was added to Article 240 is another thing I have written about in a past *Wire*. **240.16 Interrupting rating.** This goes back to **Section 110.9** which is also title **Interrupting rating,** this section requires you to have an overcurrent protective device with at least equal to the available fault current at the line terminals of the equipment. The minimum interrupting rating of at least 5,000amps. Remember I have heard me say many time circuit breakers have no rejection feature, so when replacing a breaker, it is important to look at the AIC rating of that breaker.

## Top Three Code Violations Louisville Metro Inspections MARCH 2025

These violations are costing you time and money.

## 1. NEC Article # 230.28 Service Masts as Supports

Only power service-drop or overhead service conductors shall be permitted to be attached to a service mast. Service masts used for the support of service-drop or overhead service conductors shall be installed in accordance with 230.28(A) and (B).

# 2. <u>NEC Article # 230.10 Vegetation as Support.</u>

Vegetation such as trees shall not be used for support of overhead service conductors or service equipment.

# 3. NEC Article # 110.3(B) Installation and Use.

Listed or labeled equipment shall be installed and used in accordance with any instructions included in the listing or labeling.

We hope this will help save you time and money on inspection fees by reviewing the articles and making sure you have not violated the code before calling for the initial inspection.
